GRESHAM COLLEGE HISTORY

Gresham College was London's first institute of higher education when it was founded in 1597 under the terms of Sir Thomas Gresham's Will. Unusually for the time, Gresham lectures were free and given in both English and Latin - most other higher education of the period was in Latin only - making them accessible to anyone who had the time to attend. We have been providing free education to the public ever since.




